

Introduction

Few people ever get the opportunity to be involved in organising a World Championship sports event. It is most likely, therefore, that those who volunteer to organise the World Deaf Golf Championship have little experience of what the task entails. One thing that would help would be to learn something from the experiences of those who organised earlier Championships, even although situations and circumstances are likely to be different from one country to another. In submitting this report, the Scottish Deaf Golf Association has focused on what they consider were the key factors in organising the 8th Championships. The report also suggests what should be done differently on future occasions in order that there is continuous improvement in both the organisation of the Championships and the standards of player performance.

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Overview

At Edmonton in Canada in 2006, members of the World Deaf Golf Federation (WDGF) took the decision that the 8th World Championships would be held in 2010, at the historic home of golf, in St Andrews, Scotland. The venue chosen by host, the Scottish Deaf Golf Association (SDGA), was the Fairmont Golf Resort and the Championships would be played over the Torrance Course which carries the name of one of Scotland's most famous golfers and former Ryder Cup captain, Sam Torrance.

It was clear when entries closed in April 2010, that the choice of St Andrews was immensely popular with deaf golfers around the world, as all sixteen member nations of WDGF had entered 119 golfers for the Championships, making this a new record for the event.

From the time in 2006 when Scotland won the bid to host the 2010 Championships, SDGA was faced with the huge challenge of putting together the resources to organise an unforgettable event and create for the participants an experience of St Andrews and Scotland that would be remembered for the rest of their lives.

A key decision was made by the organisers at the outset, to engage events management company Sportworks, on a contract, to organise sponsorship, accommodation, the golf course and social facilities, local transport arrangements and also to provide assistance, where necessary, to all visiting teams with their travel arrangements. This left the Local Organising Committee (LOC) to concentrate their efforts on organising the golf and social aspects of the event, arranging publicity and marketing, raising funds and finding enough volunteers to run the event.

The event turned out to be outstandingly successful, with all participants agreeing that playing the 8th World Deaf Golf Championship at St Andrews did indeed turn out to be an unforgettable experience.

The Opening Ceremony at the Fairmont Hotel was addressed by the Provost of Fife, Councillor Frances Melville, and she later hosted a drinks reception provided by Fife Council to welcome all participants.









The weather during the event was the usual summer mixture for Scotland of sun, high winds and driving rain; but much to the relief of the organisers, the overseas visitors adopted a very positive attitude and accepted that the variable weather conditions were an essential part of the 'St Andrews experience'.

The combination of, at times, difficult weather conditions, a tough championship course and players simply taking too long with their shots resulted in many rounds taking much longer than had been planned for. This caused problems off the course as well as on it. Scores information and the starting sheet for the next round were late in being produced and the players finishing late had little time to prepare for the evening activities.

With the help of the National Deaf Children's Society, tuition sessions were organised on two afternoons, when the local professional gave instruction to a number of deaf children who had come from all parts of Scotland, many sampling golf for the first time.











A midweek cultural event was held at the Dukes clubhouse outside St. Andrews with a banquet and a stirring performance by a Scottish medieval themed band "Clann An Drumma' which provided a relaxing time with everyone joining in and dancing the night away.





The final outcomes may have proved the benefits of having experience of windy conditions. Two home players, both of whom were new to the event, were first and second in the men's championship. David Ewen became the first European to win this title with a very creditable 4-round total of 300, just 12 strokes over par. Steven Cafferty, was second, a further 10 strokes behind. These two excellent performances were a big factor in Scotland becoming the first European nation to win the men's team championship. Melissa Stockton of USA, in her first year in the championship, won the ladies title with a four-round total of 363 and in doing so she helped the USA team win the ladies team championship. Kenneth Hoffman of Canada won the senior men's championship at the first attempt with a total of 332.

It was a fitting climax to the week that the Presentation Banquet was held in the world famous Hall of Champions at the prestigious Old Course Hotel. As night fell, participants enjoyed a pre-dinner drink overlooking, possibly, the most famous hole in golf, the Road Hole, 17th on the Old Course, with the landmark R&A Clubhouse in the background. Many would be imagining they were following in the footsteps of the greatest golfers in the world who had played there only days before in the 150th Open Championship.

Whist the SDGA and the LOC have every reason to be satisfied that their efforts produced an outstanding championships, perhaps the most pleasing factor was that it was achieved only through the immense voluntary contributions made by members of the wider deaf community in Scotland. The financial contributions made by various agencies were also of great importance. Much work has still to be done to ensure the event produces a lasting legacy for the Scotlish deaf community. Steps are being taken to encourage young deaf people in Scotland to take up golf. Also, the new found confidence of those who learned so much as volunteers is being used as an example to show other deaf people that they too can produce the skills and determination to take on and succeed with difficult challenges in life.






Organisation

The Local Organising Committee was chaired by David Wilson, who at a later stage also became the Tournament Director. The other members were Gerry Hughes, Craig Rayment and Scott Ritchie. Stuart Ritchie, Iain Cameron and Liz Scott-Gibson were advisers to the committee.

The decision to engage Sportworks to take responsibility for organising the hire of the golf course, accommodation, facilities for the social events and local transport, relieved the LOC of a large part of the task of organising the event. Sportworks arranged setting up of the event website and by this means organised registration and reservation of accommodation, as well as bookings for the three social events. Communications with each nation, and many individuals, were good and the arrangement appeared to work to the complete satisfaction of everyone who used their services. Sportworks staff were present at St Andrews throughout the event and their contribution to its success was confirmed by the warm offerings of thanks and praise they received from participants at the Presentation Banquet.

Looking back, there were aspects of Sportworks involvement that could have been done differently. One would have been to have had a clearer understanding at an early stage on where the divisions of responsibility lay. This could have avoided the extensive exchanges of emails at a late stage, made necessary by the fact that the Sportworks contact was based in San Francisco and visited the UK only occasionally. The other matter that caused concern to the LOC was that Sportworks efforts to raise sponsorship from within the golf industry were not producing the funds needed to run the Championships. The LOC ended up having to take on full responsibility for this itself.

In the weeks before the event started, the LOC was strengthened with the addition of volunteers Kay Hughes, Margaret Aitken and Keith Hyland, who took on team leader roles. They then did an excellent job in finding volunteers from all over Scotland, and some from England, who took on the various jobs involved in running the golf tournament.

Funding the event

It might be expected that organisers of a major golf event in Scotland could expect lots of funding support from golf organisations and sponsorship from business organisations. The disappointing responses to the early efforts made by Sportworks to obtain sponsorship indicated that the WDGC was not seen by the golf industry as an attractive sponsorship opportunity. The approaches made to a wide range of business organisations also failed to produce a sponsor. Apart from a generous donation from the R&A, the only other golf or sports organisation to provide any finance to the LOC, was Dunfermline Golf Club.

Fortunately, Event Scotland, the national agency which promotes Scotland as an event destination, agreed to provide a grant. 'Awards for All', the lottery funded grants agency, also gave generous support. Fife Council, the local government organisation, provided support from two of its grant funds and also provided the drinks reception following the Opening Ceremony. The remaining funding income came as donations from an individual and from the Deaf social clubs at Fife, Edinburgh and Glasgow.

When public funds are given to support an event, the funders often direct how some of the money should be spent. All the organisers that donated to WDGC 2010, indicated that they expected to see some of the money being spent on a legacy of the event.

The Scottish Deaf Golf Association share of the £183.75 operating profit will be used to provide opportunities for young Deaf people in Scotland to learn to play golf.

Publicity



Against the background of extensive coverage in the Scottish media of major golf events, including this year the Open Championship at St Andrews, it proved very difficult to get any general news coverage of WDGC in newspapers, golf magazines or on TV. The BBC magazine programme for deaf people, 'See Hear' did film during the week and produced a report that was broadcast in early September. Unfortunately they were unable to cover the event climax and the presentation of prizes.

The LOC appointed Sign-now.com, a local company that produces signed video clips for the Deaf community and which operates its own website Sign-Tube.com, to produce video news clips for posting on the WDGC 2010 website prior to the

event. They also filmed daily reports from St Andrews which were broadcast world-wide on Sign-Tube.

The late finish to each round, unfortunately, was the cause of scores not being posted daily on the Championship website. The webmaster responsible for updating had agreed to work extra hours, but the scores were still not available in time and could not be posted until the following morning.

seventy-six in the men's competition, twenty-three in the senior's and fifteen ladies. Five of the players who had entered withdrew for various reasons before the event. Germany and Netherlands were making their first appearance in the championships. Unfortunately the entry from Norway was withdrawn, leaving a still record number of 15 countries taking part.

One hundred and fourteen players teed off on the opening day,

Clubhouse

The tournament referees were all volunteers from the Scottish Golf Union's approved list of referees.

The Torrance Course had been used as a qualifying course for the Open Championship six weeks previously and the Scottish Seniors Open Championship would be played there the week following WDGC 2010. Although hole yardages were much less than for the professional events, it became clear from an early stage that the higher handicap players in particular were finding the course difficult. The opening match of the tournament on the Tuesday morning gave warning of things to come, when two of the three players decided they needed to play provisional balls off the 1st tee. Delays built up as rounds progressed each day causing frustration to many players. Although



some measures were introduced to speed up play, there was little improvement through the four rounds. Worst affected were the leading players in each competition, in the final round, who teed off 90 minutes later then scheduled. This led, unfortunately, to the finish being something of an anti-climax. With the final matches coming to the 18th green only minutes before the Presentation Banquet was due to begin, most people had left the course and returned to their hotel rooms to prepare and make the journey to the Old Course Hotel.



Player nameplates and a scoreboard were used in the tournament for the first time. The nameplates were a useful way of introducing each player on the 1st tee and they were also used to show the leaders on the scoreboard at the end of each round. The plan to show the progress of the leading players on the scoreboard in each championship for the closing holes was not a total success because there were not enough people available to communicate all the leading scores from the course.

Tee Markers For the first time in these championships, golfers were able to make direct mobile phone contact with a sign language interpreter who relayed messages about disputes and rules issues direct to the championship referees. This allowed matters to be dealt quickly.

Great credit must be given to the volunteers who carried out the duties of marshalling, starting, scoring and other essential tasks for long hours during the tournament. Most had little, if any, experience of working at a golf tournament. Yet they endured the full hardships of long hours and at times, very inclement weather, to keep the tournament running.





What could have been done better?

If the LOC had to organise the next championship, the following would be done differently:

- The event would not be held on a course that would be used for a professional tournament
- The contract with the event company would be clearer about the responsibilities of both sides and a commitment would be made to hold more regular face-to-face meetings to monitor progress and sort out issues which had arisen
- A more detailed list of duties would be produced; the number of volunteers required would then be matched to the list and in some cases, practice runs would be organised to familiarise volunteers with their tasks
- A person with media skills/experience would be added to the LOC, or engaged for this purpose
- WDGF would be requested to advise all member nations of the importance of all their players knowing the Rules of Golf and in particular how to avoid slow play.
- All participating players would require to attend a meeting with WDGF officials, the course professional and referees for the purpose of making clear the need to avoid slow play. Referees would be told to penalise players who continued to play too slowly. (The new qualifying handicaps agreed for introduction in the 2012 event should help ease the problem)
- A check to be made that all participants were in possession of a mobile phone SIM card suitable for the local network
- Written instruction would be issued to those permitted to use golf buggies telling them clearly where they can go and where they couldn't go on the course.
- A procedure would be put in place to advise all players on the course when weather conditions were dangerous and they must leave the course
- Name tags/stickers would be issued to each player for displaying on their clothing or golf bag, for identification purposes
- Where possible a 'scorer' would go round with the leading groups for the last round so that they could communicate scores to the scoreboard operator as play progressed
- Arrangements would be in place to allow scores to be posted from the event location to the Championships website

Points for WDGF to consider for future championships

- If the number of entrants continues to grow, it may become necessary to use a second course for ladies and senior men. This would increase costs to the LOC.
- Consideration should be given to playing WDGC every four years instead of every two years. This would give LOCs more time to raise the money to meet the cost and it may also mean that all nations could enter the maximum number of players in their team.
- Nations in membership of WDGF should be encouraged to organise age group international competitions with each other as a means of preparing younger players for full participation in the World Deaf Golf Championship.
